

Purpose

The Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Related Disabilities (LEND) program provides interdisciplinary training to healthcare providers and professionals.

LEND prepares trainees to improve the lives of children and youth with autism and other developmental disabilities (ASD/DD).

Texas is home to two LEND programs, located at UT Austin and UT Health Houston.

LEND programs are funded through the Autism CARES Act, originally passed in 2006 with **strong bipartisan support**.

The Act was authored by Republican Senator Rick Santorum and **aims to** raise public awareness of autism and enhance services across the lifespan.

The Autism CARES Act supports interdisciplinary **training and services for individuals with autism** and other developmental disabilities.

Texas LEND programs at UT Austin and UTHealth Houston **rely entirely on federal funding** to carry out their mission.

Statewide Impact in Texas

Since the Texas LEND programs started,

- **333 long-term trainees** have completed LEND training in Texas.
- Over 1,400 medium- and short-term trainees have received interdisciplinary training.
- More than 1,900 professionals have been trained across the lifespan of Texas LEND programs.
- Continuing education provided to thousands of additional professionals through webinars and conferences.
- Faculty from over 20 disciplines have contributed to training, mentorship, and curriculum development.

Why This Matters for Texas

~20 months

Texas children are diagnosed with autism ~20 months later than the national average.

1 in 51 Texan Children

Only 1 in 51 Texas children are diagnosed, compared to 1 in 31 nationally. This means we are missing autism in 40% of the children in Texas who need a diagnosis to access appropriate interventions.

Access Barriers Across the State

- Rural areas lack providers trained in autism diagnosis.
- Families often face wait times over a year for assessments.
- Early detection offsets costs: Within 2 years, early diagnosis reduces the need for more expensive long-term services.

The Role of LEND

- Trains professionals across disciplines to improve early identification and care.
- Increases access to services in underserved regions.
- Develops leaders equipped to advance policy, practice, and research in autism care.
- With Texas's 2025 population projected at 31.85 million, an estimated 1+ million Texans may be on the autism spectrum.
- Sustaining federal funding through the Autism CARES Act is essential to close the diagnosis gap and support children and families across Texas.
- Early detection offsets costs: Within 2 years, early diagnosis reduces the need for more expensive long-term services.
